TODAY: Barry Sanderson, Sports Radio Host: Brock Jones




A native of Tuscaloosa (Central High School grad) and a 1990 graduate of The University of Alabama, **Barry Sanderson** was a part of winning and successful teams everywhere he coached. Barry's career coaching college basketball spans more than 20 years if you include his start as a student assistant under his father at Alabama. [See right.]

After graduating from the Capstone in 1990, he worked at Texas A&M for the 1990-91 season as a graduate assistant coach. The next season, he worked in the same capacity at Georgia. He went on to make assistant coaching stops at Arkansas-Little Rock, East Carolina, Lipscomb, Wake Forest, and South Carolina. From 1992 through 1998, Barry served in a variety of positions at Arkansas-Little Rock, where he was a successful recruiter and helped coach players such as NBA first-round draft pick Derek Fisher. During his stay at UALR, the Trojans captured the Sun Belt Conference regular-season title and went to the NIT. For four seasons in Little Rock, he worked under his father, head coach Wimp Sanderson, who served 38 years as a college coach.

His time with the Gamecocks included a trip to the 2004 NCAA tournament and back-to-back NIT Championships (2005 & 2006).

Since retiring from coaching in 2009 Barry has had success in business and worked with ESPN Radio in Columbia, S.C. After moving home, Barry stayed in the game by running the Sanderson Basketball Academy and acting as director for two successful high school tournaments in Alabama. Barry is married to the former Jenny McIlwain of Tuscaloosa and they have six children, ranging from 3 months to age 21.
